This document is a *work in progress* of the African American Revolutionary Soldiers Honor Project. The information presented is preliminary and will evolve in light of new or corrected data.

The purpose of this project is to identify

- (1) South Carolina men of color
- (2) who were free at the time of their service and
- (3) who had verifiable military service during the Revolutionary War (1775-1783).

For purposes of this research, South Carolina may be the birth place or residence of the Patriot, pre- or post-war years.

This South Carolina Working List builds upon compilations, primary and other sources (indicated in the right column of the table below).

## 7. SC Accounts Audited or Stub Indents and U.S. census records.

The “Description/Notes” column includes confirmation of service and status as a free man of color (FMOC), as well as evidence from military records, census and civil sources. Men whose free status, race or service are unverified or unclear are noted as such.

**Preliminary data trends:** Black Patriot (or survivor) claims for compensation due to Revolutionary War service: 29 in South Carolina Accounts Audited or SC Stub Indents; 24 federal claims for soldier’s pensions, widow’s pensions or bounty land; 1 in NC court. Service in Continental regiments: 23 in 3<sup>rd</sup> SC Regiment; 10 in 6<sup>th</sup> SC Regiment; 4 in 4<sup>th</sup> SC Regiment; 4 in 1<sup>st</sup> SC Regiment. Nine men in the SC Navy or on Patriot ships (3 on schooner *Defence*; 1 independent pilot on a French ship). There were 5 drummers and 1 fifer. Twenty-one were in militia units. Forty-eight are verified as free men of color at the time of Revolutionary War service.

*(2) Racial identity of servant-soldiers attending SC officers held at Haddrell’s Point SC after the fall of Charleston SC.*
